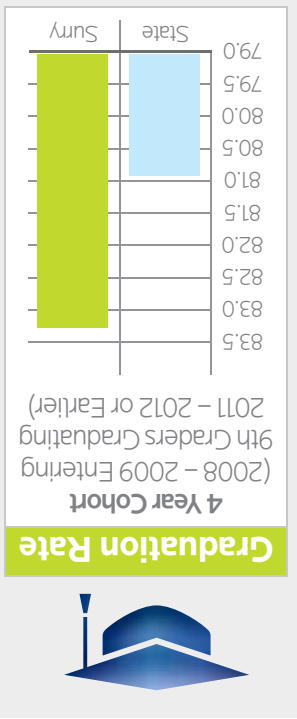

Do You Know?

- The state recognized thirteen (13) schools as **Schools of Distinction** and one (1) school as **Honor School of Excellence**.
- Eighteen (18) schools have a performance composite **above 80%** and none below 78%. This places students in grades 3-8 performing in the **top 20** school districts of a total of 115 in North Carolina.
- District-wide math proficiency remains **above 90% for the third straight year**. This places students in grades 3-8 performing in the **top 10%** school districts in North Carolina.
- Since science has been included in the ABCs results the district-wide proficiency has **increased each year**.
- The overall End-of-Course proficiency remained **above 85%** for the third straight year. This places high school students performing in the **top 15** school districts in North Carolina.
- The **Battle of the Books** program was added to all elementary schools and **Debate Teams** were added to Middle and High Schools.
